There are many, many ham radio awards that can be earned. You can chase states or counties. You can follow lighthouses, beaches, parks and even summits. Prefixes or special events like the 13 Colonies. Contests occur most weekends and may be CW or SSB or Mixed or Digital. It is all up to what interests you.

Propagation continues to improve as we come out the low end of the sunspot cycle. Obtaining awards will also get easier. You do not need a mega station, just the tools you have available; radio, antenna, skill, luck and more.

Although 6 meters has not been much this pre-winter season, the sunspot numbers have been promising, with bands like 10 meters up and running. And yes, Techs, you have some ssb privileges on 10...and yes, in a couple years you can work the world on 5 watts and a piece of wire...all true. But for now use the tools, clusters, and modes you like and have fun.

For dxer's, chasing DXCC is the award. The starting award is working and confirming 100 different entities. Entities are similar to countries and in most instances are countries. Rules allow separation from parent country by a certain distance (i.e. Alaska and Hawaii) as well as other considerations that today lists 340 entities that can be worked for credit in DXCC. In 1978 I applied for my first DXCC. It took 13 months from start to working and confirming. At that time there were no clusters and information came from QST monthly and some bi-weekly bulletins in the mail. QSL cards came in the mail and thru the buro system.

In the past, a few of us would challenge who can work 100 or more during a contest weekend. Some times it was not too hard but was work. Today we still are not at the best time and what I found out during CQWW the end of November is how much Covid had impacted trying to work 100 countries/entities. Most countries have imposed restrictions on travel to them and many groups who regularly operated from the Caribbean or Africa, could not. So a lot of what would be fairly easy contacts just were not there.

So, back to the tools, knowledge, propagation, use of bands open and good old luck. It took operating on and off over the weekend to make 108 contacts that included 100 different entities in the log. Four bands, 40, 20, 15, and 10 were used and you see in the picture how the log looked after day one with 82 different entities logged. W8PI had similar results and worked over 170 contacts.

So far, I've only watched the GOLF-TEE System Overview and the AMSAT Education presentation. They were both interesting and I'm looking forward to watching the others.

I really hadn't been keeping up with AMSAT lately, so the presentation on the GOLF project was definitely news to me. GOLF is an ambitious project aimed at sending up high Earth orbit (HEO) satellites. GOLF is short for "Greater Orbits Larger (user communication) Footprints." This is really pretty exciting stuff.

Watching these presentations really gives one an appreciation for the work that goes into the design of these satellites and the technical skills and dedication of the hams working on these projects. These guys are not getting paid to do any of this work, and as Eric Skoog, K1TVV, the GOLF System Engineer said in his presentation, "Space is hard."




Here is what I do for fun and to see if the radio works.....

The trip to Malan Waterfowl Production Area was good and roads only had a little snow earlier. Malan is KFF-5194 and new park number in Jackson County, Michigan. It is near the northern part of the Waterloo State Recreation Area and there were 4 parking lots for that area nearby.

A total of 72 contacts were made (37/20meters, 28/40meters, 7/30meters) with most on cw. Of the total, 18 were from 10 European countries. Other notes were an almost sweep of Canada; VE1, VE2, VE3(3), VE5, VE6, VE9. Alaska and 24 states are in the mix as well as 10 Park to Park contacts. A snafu while going onto 30 with the laptop and posting caused low numbers on that band.

The parking lot for Malan is small holding maybe 3-4 vehicles and is off a dirt road. There is good signage which is in the photos. Cell service was not an issue but did have some noise on 20ssb. Log uploaded to LoTW and park programs. De KG8P
